In addition to the formal curriculum, there has never been a better time to teach your child key life-skills. I have been so delighted to see the number of parents on Twitter passing on their own knowledge and experience to their children. This is fully in keeping with our school Mission Statement, 'Be who God created you to be and you will set the world on fire'. Our children don't need knowledge in the abstract, they need to go out and use what they have learnt – that is why we have a cross-curricular, practical, skills-based curriculum at St Catherine's.





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### <u>Life Skills</u>

During lockdown, consider taking the opportunity to teach your child to:

- Tie their laces
- Make a cup of tea
- Cook and butter toast
- Prepare a sandwich
- Make their own bed
- Tie a tie
- Vacuum and dust
- Iron
- Wash windows
- Use a tin opener
- Chop an onion safely
- Change a lightbulb

Change a plug

Paint

Use basic tools like a sa

- Organise their books in alphabetical order
- Sew

They are life-skills, but they will also make your life easier!

### Applied Learning

Just as you aren't teachers, we aren't plumbers, hairdressers, cooks, carpenters, book-keepers, shop assistants etc. You have a wealth of skills that you can impart during this time, that no teacher could.

1. Play to your own strengths. Many of you will have a trade – take the opportunity to pass it on! My dad couldn't tell you how to use an apostrophe correctly (that was my mum's remit), but he taught me an awful lot of other things. While helping him work, my dad explained how household electrics function, what rating fuse to use for different types of appliance, to always measure twice and cut once, the difference between imperial and metric units and showed me how to correctly use a drill, saw, screw driver and paintbrush –among other things.

Many of you will have practical skills that you can pass on to your children – do it! Can you teach your child/ren to:

rew driver, Allen Keys, pliers and wire strippers

- Use a hammer without hitting their thumb (you only do it once!)

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These are skills that can be taught under supervision, with clear rules (my dad checked every single plug before use!) and a focus on safety. Please, please don't gender stereotype – girls should be able to use a hammer and boys should be able to iron!

My skills are based on those of my parents. Pass on the knowledge that you have – if you are a hairdresser, teach them about cutting, colouring, styling... If you are a cleaner, teach them which products to use in different parts of the home, tell them how often different tasks should be done and get them involved. If you are a shop assistant, talk to the kids about money, practise giving change, discuss different produce and how it gets from farm to shop. You each have important things that you can teach your kids that have nothing to do with the National Curriculum.

- 2. Teach your children to stay safe. Depending on their age, consider the following:
  - Do you have a fire plan? Have they practised it? Can they get out of the windows in an emergency?
  - Do they know where the stopcock is?
  - Do they know where the fuse box is located?
  - Have they memorised their address and your phone number?
  - Do they know what to do if they get lost?
  - Have you talked to your children about online safety?
  - Do they know about Stranger Danger?
  - Do they understand the NSPCC 'Pants Rule'?
  - Are they aware of basic First Aid e.g. if you have a burnt finger, run it under cold water ...
- 3. There is learning in absolutely everything! If you have more than one child at home and they are getting along without killing each other – they are learning teamwork! Boggle teaches spelling, 'Squares' teaches strategy, Pass the Pigs teaches mental maths, Trivial Pursuits provides general knowledge, Monopoly creates an entrepreneurial spirit and Twister is just great fun!! Keep it real and find learning in the simplest of activities.
- 4. Use screen time effectively. From Number Jacks to Octonaughts, Blue Planet to Percy Jackson, there are loads of things that your children could watch which tick an educational box. They will also provide you with a much-needed sanity-break!
