Science	Reflecting on their own experiences, children learn about the four seasons and the weather associated with each. Pupils explore how seasonal changes affect trees, daylight hours and our choices about outfits. They plan and carry out their own weather reports, considering the knowledge required for this job.	Everyday Materials Identifying the difference between objects and materials, children explore their surroundings to find examples of each. They scientifically investigate the properties of materials and begin to sort and group materials by their properties. Pupils discover that some materials are a result of scientific experimentation and that some materials can be recycled to conserve resources.	Sensitive Bodies Familiarising themselves with the basic parts of the human body, children investigate their senses through stimulating experiences that highlight how we interact with the world around us. They develop an understanding of the importance of our senses and how science can support those who have lost sensory function.	Comparing Animals Studying both local and global animals, children recognise common features and use this information to make comparisons and begin to classify animals. Pupils collect data by surveying class pets, to then explore ways in which this information can be recorded. They develop their understanding of classification by comparing the dietary habits of different animals and use their knowledge and imaginations to take on the role of a zookeeper.	Introduction to Plants Identifying the key features of a plant, children describe important structures and make comparisons between different plants. Pupils use investigative skills to record the growth of a plant over time and begin to reflect on factors that will affect its development. They begin to explore how plants are used by humans and grow their own herb garden.	Making Connections This unit aims to bring together pupils' science learning from the other units and help them to see connections between the key areas.	Science Week
